Dear Professor Shotwell,

Back in Geneva let me thank you again most heartily for your cordial reception. It is thanks to your intervention that I went to the United States, and the visit was from every point of view extremely worth while. The letters of introduction you gave me for Washington were invaluable and I only regret that owing to a slip in arrangements I was unable to stay long enough at the luncheon you so kindly arranged for me at the Faculty Club.

I have made out a memorandum for Bonnet and Montenach dealing with all the questions which we discussed in New York. I have also sent on to the Institute some of the material you sent to me on the boat. No doubt you will soon hear from the Director and his collaborators, especially regarding questions connected with the 1937 session.

Professor Kimmel, the Editor of "Social Studies", and Mrs. Erna Grassmuck from State Teachers' College, Indiana, Pennsylvania, Secretary of the National Council of Geographic Teachers, are both willing to carry out for the United States the consultation regarding the teaching of history and geography foreseen in the League Teaching Advisory Committee's major resolution of last year, provided your Committee will authorize them to go ahead.

As we are planning to send out the letters for this consultation in February, I would be greatly indebted to you if you would let me know whether this scheme meets with your approval.

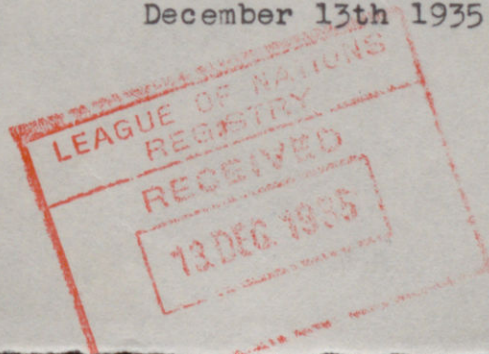

I shall also ask the Director of the Institute to give me whatever matters he would like me to handle for him while in the States.

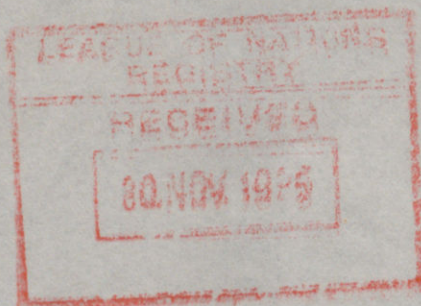
I am much looking forward to be again in the States.

Participation au Congrès annuel de la National Student Federation of America, Kansas City du 27-31 décembre 1935.

M. J. Cadden, secrétaire général de la National Student Federation of America, vient de m'adresser une lettre personnelle pour me demander, s'il me serait possible de me charger de l'une des conférences principales au Congrès annuel à Kansas City.

La NSFA groupe la jeunesse universitaire de 245 collèges et universités américains. Elle est considérée comme l'organisme le plus actif et le plus représentatif de la jeunesse universitaire des Etats Unis. Son Congrès annuel réunit des délégués nommés par les différentes branches locales de l'organisation.

Dans sa lettre, M.J.Cadden insiste plus particulièrement sur l'opportunité de confronter la jeunesse américaine avec les problèmes internationaux de l'heure actuelle et l'oeuvre entreprise par la SDN. C'est pour cette raison que son Comité exécutif l'a chargé de faire appel à une personnalité du Secrétariat connaissant, d'une part, les Etats Unis, d'autre part, les milieux estudiantins.

Vous trouverez ci-joint une lettre du Professeur Shotwell, président de la C.N. de coopération intellectuelle américaine, dans laquelle il m'encourage vivement à me rendre à Kansas City et espère que je pourrai me mettre à la disposition de la CN.

La NSFA s'offre à payer tous mes frais de voyage et de séjour à condition que j'accepte de parler dans quelques universités à l'issue du Congrès.

Compte tenu de la durée du voyage il conviendrait d'envisager une absence de Genève de 4-5 semaines.

En l'absence de M. Pilotti j'ai consulté M. de Montenach. Il s'est prononcé en faveur de ce voyage de même que M. Sweetser.

La saison à laquelle ce voyage aurait lieu correspond à la période de ralentissement de notre activité pendant les fêtes de fin d'année. Le préjudice que mon absence causerait à l'exécution des travaux qui m'incombent serait donc limité dans une certaine mesure.

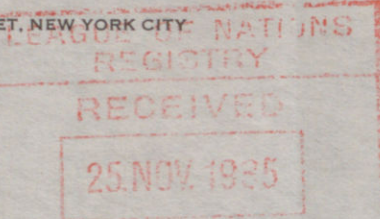

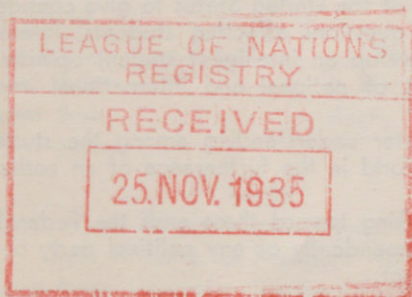

● THE NATIONAL STUDENT FEDERATION OF AMERICA

was founded in 1925 at a conference of student representatives from 245 colleges and universities meeting at Princeton.

For ten years NSFA has functioned as the national intercollegiate student government association. Student government is a laboratory of citizenship. There is no factor in student life which contributes more directly to raising of campus standards, none deserves so much the co-operation of students and educational administrators.

PURPOSE

To achieve a spirit of co-operation among the students of the United States to give consideration to questions affecting students' interests.

To develop an intelligent student opinion on questions of national and international importance.

To foster understanding among the students of the world in the furtherance of an enduring peace.

In working toward these ends the Federation acts independently of any political party or religious sect.

ORGANIZATION

MEMBERSHIP is composed of the student bodies of individual colleges and universities. The student body joins as a unit through the action of its governing board.

ANNUAL CONGRESS, attended by delegates elected by member colleges, is the source of authority. These representatives determine program and policy.

EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE, composed of eight regional representatives and three national members-at-large, is responsible for interpreting policy between Congresses.

CABINET, a committee of ten, five selected by the Executive Committee and five from the last National Committee of International Student Service in the U. S., to serve as an active advisory group in administrative affairs.

NATIONAL BOARD OF ADVISERS, thirteen members serving three years each (four elected by the Congress each year), aid in directing policy and promoting activities.

ALUMNI COUNCIL includes outstanding college graduates who have been leaders in NSFA affairs.

National Congress

The Eleventh Annual Congress will convene in Kansas City, Mo., under the auspices of the University of Kansas, December 27 through the 31st. Student leaders will discuss improved methods of self-government and outline NSFA policy. Consideration of national college and public issues is provided for in round-table meetings led by experts.

District Conferences

During the second semester, representatives will meet in the eight territorial divisions of member colleges to discuss local problems.

Monthly Magazine

"The National Student Mirror," first published in 1933, is maintained to crystallize student opinion and give it adequate expression.

Weekly News-Release

A news service to college papers, student governing boards and all interested in the progress of undergraduate affairs. It is a compendium of student and youth activities in this country and abroad.

Broadcasting

Through the courtesy of the Columbia Broadcasting System, the Federation presents student speakers on politics and education in a series of weekly programs over a nation-wide network.

Forums

To further its purpose of developing an intelligent student opinion, NSFA organizes local discussion groups. In colleges where no such unit exists, NSFA Forums are established. On other campuses, Unions, Social Problems Clubs, Liberal Clubs, International Clubs, etc., are urged to cooperate with National Headquarters to stimulate discussion and action on special issues.

Relief

Expanding this year to take over the work of International Student Service in the United States, NSFA is assisting foreign refugee students in this country. Eight with particular ability were brought here by ISS and are being supported by NSFA with the help of universities they are attending and the Phi Sigma Delta fraternity. Many others are provided with limited aid.

Survey and Information Bureau

Surveys are conducted to provide statistical evidence on student problems. Results concerning self-government, honor system, fraternities, cooperatives and many other subjects are available. In addition, a general information service to deal with organizational problems is maintained.

International Debating

Schedules for teams representing Oxford and Cambridge Universities to debate here this fall have been completed. Arrangements for Edinburgh and Melbourne University debating tours will be made for the second semester.

Debaters to represent the Federation in England this Spring are to be chosen in January. Last season the Emory University (Ga.) team made the trip.

Travel and Identity Card

In collaboration with The Open Road, special tours to Europe and the Soviet Union are arranged. Last Summer ninety-six undergraduates took advantage of the service which includes unusual cultural facilities abroad.

As the sole American distributors of the International Student Identity Card, which entitles bearers to railroad and hotel reductions, free entrance to museums and special visa privileges, the Federation makes inexpensive vacations abroad possible.

Cooperation with Public Agencies

NSFA has cooperated with State and Federal agencies in developing student aid. It has been active in promoting government part-time jobs in colleges and was an important factor in bringing about the establishment of the National Youth Administration.

To train young leaders in practical government, the Federation assisted in establishing the National Institution of Public Affairs in Washington.

Speakers Bureau

Student speakers on a variety of subjects are available in every section of the country.

Foreign Relations

NSFA is affiliated with International Student Service and represents American students in world affairs through the Confederation Internationale des Etudiants.
